

CT-OEC101- Care4Kids Health and Safety Basics for Center and School Staff (5 hour) -

Welcome to CT-OEC101

The State of Connecticut requires Health and Safety training for all child care providers participating in the Care 4 Kids system. This course provides introductory information about child development and the elements of a child care environment that promote healthy child development and keep children safe. The course is broken down into five sections:

- 1. Child Development
- 2. Shaken Baby Syndrome, SIDS, and Child Abuse
- 3. Nutrition, Food Allergies, and Physical Activity
 4. Health and Hygiene Practices, Indoor and Outdoor Safety
- 5. Emergency Preparedness and Response Planning, Precautions in Transporting Children

Course Objectives:

- Recognize early experiences that promote healthy brain development
- Identify ways that children develop and construct knowledge

Section 2 Objectives:

- Identify facts about SIDS, including preventative measures that should be taken in a child care setting
- Recognize signs of shaken baby syndrome and strategies for preventing it
- Identify the responsibilities of mandated reporters of child abuse and neglect
- Recall signs and symptoms of child abuse and neglect (measured within the course)
- Identify the effects of repeated early childhood maltreatment

Section 3 Objectives:

- Identify ways to ensure that children receive proper nutrition
- List strategies for caring for children with food allergies
- Recognize teaching practices that promote physical fitness

Section 4 Objectives:

- Identify ways to prevent injury from common indoor and outdoor hazards
- Give examples of ways to cut down on the spread of germs and infectious diseases

Section 5 Objectives:

- Identify best practices in preparing and responding to emergency situations
- Define roles and responsibilities of adults working with children
 Describe recommended practices for the use of child restraint systems according to the National Transportation Safety Board and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration
